Catalog Course Description:

This course introduces students to the characteristics of the criminal justice system in the United States. Focus is placed on examining crime measurement, theoretical explanations of crime, responses to crime, components of the system, and current challenges to the system.

The course examines the evolution of the principles and approaches utilized by the justice system and the evolving forces which have shaped those principles and approaches. Although justice structure and process is examined in a cross-cultural context, emphasis is placed on the US justice system, particularly the structure and function of US police, courts and corrections.

Students are introduced to the origins and development of criminal law, legal process, sentencing, and incarceration policies.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Given a scenario the students will correctly identify how the principles of law enforcement, the courts, or corrections apply.
- 2. Presented with a narrative the students will correctly document the information with proper punctuation and grammar.
- 3. Presented with a real-life problem the students will effectively analyze the ethical issues involved

Grading

All of the topics will be related to the class and all students are invited to share their thoughts.
