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Río Hondo College Library

The Library is sometimes described as the intellectual hub of the campus, because this is the place where students read and do homework; work with librarians to learn how to find books and articles, do research, and cite sources; and take advantage of free resources like computers, scanners, and printers. But the Library is also a cozy spot to read a book, reserve a group study room, or just take a break in a comfy chair or on top of an oversized bean bag!

Information Resources & the Library Catalog

The Library has almost 90,000 print books—including things like graphic novels and children's books—hundreds of thousands of electronic books, hundreds of thousands of scholarly journal articles that "live" in a whole bunch of databases, and thousands of streaming videos, all of which you can discover via the Library's catalog using the OneSearch tool: https://gorio.page/onesearch.

Need help finding a particular book or article—or finding books and articles about a particular subject? *No problem:*

Ask a Librarian!

Friendly, accessible, helpful librarians staff the Library's Reference Desk every hour of every day the Library is open to help you with your research and information needs. If you have questions about *anything* related to research, librarians are here to help! Orientations, Guides, and Workshops

Computers, Printing/Copying, & Study Spaces

But wait, there's more! In Spring 2024, the Library's Computer Commons and classrooms got more than 100 brand new PC desktop computers and laptops! Students can use these computers to get online, Zoom, or access the Library's electronic resources. Students can also print from these computers in the Library's Copy Center, which also includes copy machines and rapid scanners for student use. 

"Automatic Enrollment" Connects Students to LAC & MSEC Tutors

Río Hondo utilizes an automatic enrollment program designed to seamlessly connect students with vital academic resources at no cost. By automatically enrolling students in two complimentary "courses" in Canvas (NBAS 009 and/or NBAS 010), the initiative connects students taking certain courses with the LAC and MSEC, each staffed with specialized tutors who can meet students' coursespecific needs.

During the first week of the semester, students in specific courses are automatically enrolled in NBAS 009 and/or NBAS 010 which will show up in Canvas. These "courses" require no work, are not graded, and will not appear on students' records. Rather, they are simply platforms to help



connect students to the LAC (NBAS 009) and MSEC (NBAS 010) so that students can easily access these learning support services centers. Via the NBAS courses, students can be paired with peer tutors and/or other students to study, review, or understand concepts better. The NBAS Canvas shells also include tutorials on grammar, instructions about how to navigate NetTutor, access to Library resources, a list of other campus resources, and news about events in the LAC/MSEC.

The Math, Science, and Engineering Center (MSEC) is where successful STEM students go to really understand the concepts they encounter in their STEM courses—and for help if they're struggling!

Workshops: Chemistry, Algebra, and Statistics

Are you enrolled in a chemistry, algebra, or statistics course? Do you find that although you've covered the material in class and completed the homework, you still feel like you need more practice?

MSEC workshops are led by expert, peer tutor facilitators who provide students with an additional opportunity to practice topics from their courses with other students. Content is created by Río Hondo College STEM professors, with topics that change weekly to match what is being covered in class. Workshops usually last about an hour; workshop attendees should plan to stay for the entire workshop to complete all practice problems.

To attend MSEC workshops, which are held in person in Room LR-114, you must be a Río Hondo College student taking a math, science, and/or engineering course here currently. Days and times of workshops vary; heck https://gorio.page/MSECatRHC for the Spring 2024 schedule.

In-Person and Online Tutoring

It's a fact: students who are work with tutors do better in STEM courses. Q: What's a Peer Tutor?

A: Peer tutors are students' peers—either other students, or recently graduated students—who have demonstrated excellence in the subjects they tutor. Peer tutors work in the LAC and the MSEC. In this issue, we learn about two tutors in the MSEC: Marilin Campos and Edgar Navarro. All MSEC peer tutors are STEM majors, and have taken math, science, and/or engineering courses at Río Hondo College. All receive high recommendations from their professors for their areas of study, and as current or recent students, they are likely to have faced—and understand—the academic challenges you might be encountering!



Q: What inspired you to pursue your major?

A: My major is applied mathematics. My professors here at Río Hondo inspired me to change my major. I felt I had a great support system to be able to make this big change and pursue this major.

Q: What do you like best about tutoring in the MSEC?

A: Getting to know my supervisors and co-workers! It is always scary to ask for help. Getting to know my colleagues, developing friendships with my colleagues, is what I love best about my job. They are very supportive in helping me. I have realized it's very hard to ask for help, but once you get to know everyone, they all want to help students do better!

Q: What are some study techniques that helped you become a successful student?

A: Honestly, putting in the effort. Show up to class, pay attention, and do the work. Doing the work that is asked of me and paying attention in class. I find when talking to my classmates some do not do this! I find the homework assigned is helpful. You just must do it!

Q: What is some advice you would give a new college student?

A: Get to know your professor, go to office hours. Build a relationship with them, make sure you know their name, make sure they know yours. Build a relationship where you're comfortable asking questions, ask for help if needed.



A: I was a pure math major at UC Irvine, recently graduated. I have always found I was good with numbers—it never felt like a chore to me. I recall hearing the stigma *math is hard*, but I did not find that for myself. So, I decided since working with numbers came so easy to me, I would get a degree in math.

Q: What do you like best about tutoring in the MSEC?

Q: What inspired you to pursue your major?

A: I like being around like-minded individuals pursuing a career in a STEM field. And the ability to reinforce prior knowledge I learned working in the Center was a big part of my success at UCI, because I was constantly reviewing my math in the Center. I also really appreciate the satisfaction I get from students coming back and saying how satisfied they were with my help, that they had passed their math class. I find that part very rewarding!

Q: What are some study techniques that helped you become a successful student?

A: Definitely getting to know people in my classes, and developing friendships to form study groups. For me it helped to read books and review PowerPoints before lecture. I feel I got more from the professors' lectures in this way.

Q: What is some advice you would give a new college student?

A: Definitely make friends, put yourself out there, and make connections! Use all the resources Río Hondo has to offer, such as counseling, the Transfer Center, and tutoring—any and all resources available! Find out all that is available, and please take advantage of them all.

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
Library and Learning Support Services News and Events in Spring 2024
