Part 1. Text Citations

<u>Purpose of the in-text citation</u>: Use whenever you summarize, paraphrase, or quote from another source. The in-text citation directs the reader to the matching citation on the References page so that the reader can examine and look up that source.

In-text citations include the author's last name(s) and year of publication. Include page numbers (if present) when quoting directly or referring to specific passages.

Examples of In-Text Citations		
Type of In-Text Citation	Sample In-Text Citation	
Single Author (with author's name in text):	Zuckerman (2012) distinguished between two forms of apostasy.	
Single Author (without author's name in text):	Two dimensions of apostasy were identified from the analysis of interviews (Zuckerman 2012).	
Single Author, direct quote (without name in text):	Early apostasy vs. late apostasy is "closely linked to an individual's general maturation process" (Zuckerman 2017:7).	
Multiple Authors:	Two authors : (Martin and Bailey 1988) // Three authors : <i>First citation</i> : (Carr, Smith, and Jones 1962). <i>Later citations</i> : (Carr et. al 1962) // Four or more authors* : (Nilson et al. 1962). * <i>First author's last name plus et al. in all citations</i> .	
Group authors (corporations, associations, government agencies, etc.):	Easily identified through abbreviation: (ASA 2019). No abbreviation: (University of Pittsburgh 2005)	
Unknown or anonymous author (cite the first few words of the reference list title and year):	Use quotation marks for an article, chapter, or web page: ("Study Finds" 2009) Italicize the title of a book, periodical, or report: (Gun Control 2016:12)

Part 2: Citations for References Page

- For every text citation included in your paper, you must have a corresponding **bibliographic citation** in the References page.
- Your References page should appear as the last page(s) of your essay or research paper.
- While the examples below are shown single-spaced, ASA reference citations are always 1) double-spaced, 2) in alphabetical order, 3) with a half-inch (5 spaces) hanging indent format, and 4) one space following each period.
- Titles of publications (books, newspapers, journals, films, etc.) are put in *italics*. Article and chapter titles are put in "quotation marks."
- Use the following ASA formats and examples to help cite your own sources:

1. Citing a Print Book		
Basic Format:	Author(s) or Editor(s). Year published. <i>Title of Book</i> . (additional information specific to book, if any). Place Published: Publisher.	
Example with one author:	Esquith, Rafe. 2007. Teach Like Your Hair's On Fire: The Methods and Madness Inside Room 56. New York: Viking.	
Example with two authors:	Portes, Alejandro, and Ruben G. Rumbaut. 2014. <i>Immigrant America: A Portrait</i> . 4 th ed., Revised, updated, and expanded. Oakland, CA: University of California Press.	

Example with three or more authors:	Shaw, Kathleen M., Sara Goldrick-Rab, Christopher Mazzeo, and Jerry A. Jacobs. 2006. Putting Poor People to Work: How the Work-first Idea Eroded College Access for the Poor. New York: Russell Sage Foundation.
Example with group author (corporations, associations, government agencies, etc.):	APA (American Psychiatric Association). 2013. <i>Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders: DSM-V</i> . 5 th ed. Washington, DC: American Psychiatric Association.
Example of edited work or collection with author:	Twain, Mark. 1967. <i>Mark Twain's Satires & Burlesques</i> . Edited by F. R. Rogers. Berkeley: University of California Press.
Example of edited work or collection without author:	Territo, Leonard, and James D. Sewell, eds. 2007. <i>Stress Management in Law Enforcement</i> . 2 nd Ed. Durham, NC: Carolina Academic Press.
Example of book translation:	Zollter, Jurgen, and Willi Diez. 2008. <i>Smart: Small Car, Big Deal</i> . Translated by P. L. Albrecht. Minneapolis: Motorbooks.

2. Citing an eBook	
Basic Format:	Author(s) or Editor(s). Year Published. <i>Title of work</i> . City: Publisher. Hyperlink to DB eBook <i>or</i> http://website URL/hyperlink, <i>or</i> e-Reader type.
eBook from a library database:	Eide, Marian, and Michael Gibler. 2018. <i>After Combat: True War Stories from Iraq and Afghanistan</i> . Lincoln, NE: Potomac Books. http://search.ebscohost.com/login.aspx? direct=true&db=nlebk&AN=1847431&site=ehost-liv.
eBook available online:	Tanielian, Terri, and Lisa H. Jaycox, eds. 2008. <i>Invisible Wounds of War: Psychological and Cognitive Injuries, Their Consequences, and Services to Assist Recovery</i> . Santa Monica, CA: RAND Corporation. https://www.rand.org/pubs/monographs/MG720.html.

3. Citing a chapter or entry from a Print Book or eBook	
Basic Format*:	Author(s). Year Published. "Title of Article or Entry." Pp. start page-end page in <i>Title of Book</i> , edited by Editor(s). Volume number, <i>Title of Volume</i> (if applicable), Edition (if applicable). City: Publisher. *For digital articles or entries, omit page numbers, include URL/hyperlink.
Chapter in a print book/anthology:	Chesney-Lind, Meda. 1995. "Girls, Delinquency, and Juvenile Justice: Toward a Feminist Theory of Young Women's Crime." Pp. 71-88 in <i>The Criminal Justice System and Women: Offenders, Victims, and Workers</i> , edited and compiled by B. R. Price and N. J. Sokoloff. 2 nd ed. New York: McGraw-Hill.
Entry in a print reference book (encyclopedias/dictionaries) with no author:	"Swastika." 1997. P. 2517 in <i>Man, Myth and Magic: The Illustrated Encyclopedia of Mythology, Religion, and The Unknown</i> , edited by R. Cavendish, C. A. Burland, and B. Innes. Vol. 18. New York: Marshall Cavendish.

Title of Periodical, date, all page numbers. **Print Scholarly Journals:** Author(s). Year. "Title of Article." Title of Journal Volume(Issue):Start page-end page. **Monthly print magazine article:** **Flanagan, Caitlin. 2010. 5. Citing an Article or Report from a Library Database or Website		
Basic Format:	Online/Database Magazine or Newspaper Articles: Use above citation format for print periodicals, with URL/hyperlink. Online/Database Scholarly Journal Articles: Use above citation format for scholarly journals, with URL/hyperlink, or DOI (digital object identifier) number (if available).	
Magazine article from source's website:	Magnuson, Danielle. 2011. "Making Peace with Barbie." <i>Utne Reader</i> , September 23. http://www.utne.com/Mind-Body/Making-Peace-With-Barbie.aspx.

- Interviews, e-mails, text messages, conversations, and other personal (unpublished) communications are generally cited only in the text or footnotes, not in the References list. See page 63 in the ASA Style Guide (2022).

Part 3: Formatting Guidelines

ASA formatting recommendations include: A) **double spaced, Times New Roman 12-point font**, with B) **1-inch margins on all sides** (unless specified otherwise by instructor), and C) **headers** on all pages (shortened title of paper in caps aligned left; page number aligned right). The text **Running head =** is included on the first page only (before the shortened title). See the *ASA Style Guide* (2022), pages 53-80, for more information about formatting content.

- Formatting Quotations: Quotations of less than 50 words are incorporated into the body of your paragraph. Quotes of 50 words or more are indented on the right and left margins by 1/2" and are not enclosed in quotation marks.
- **Notes**: Footnotes and endnotes should be indicated in the text with superscripted numbers. The notes can be typed at the bottom of page as footnotes, or on a separate "Endnotes" page. Begin each note with its superscript number.
- **Tables:** numbered consecutively throughout text and included after the body of paper. Place each table on a separate page with a descriptive title and headings for all columns/rows.
- Figures, Illustrations, Photographs, and Graphic Material: numbered consecutively and labeled.
- Appendixes: If more than one, label Appendix A, Appendix B, etc. Appendixes should be labeled with a title.
