Río Hondo College Speech/Debate Team Ranked 10th in Nation Among Colleges, Universities



Río Hondo College's Forensics Speech and Debate program has been ranked 10th in the nation overall among community colleges and universities, a milestone that recognizes the hard work, dedication and persistence of the College's students and faculty over the last 50 years.

The honor was announced during the National Parliamentary Debate Association Championship from March 25 to 27. The Forensics Speech and Debate program, which was formed in 1970, has steadily climbed the ranks over the years – placing 17th in 2022, 21st in 2021 and 27th in 2020.

"It is very gratifying to feel part of this, primarily since it validates the enormous amount of work our students put in," Forensics Coordinator and Debate Coach Grant Tovmasian said. "Forensics Speech and Debate correlates with success for students. We draw our students from political sciences, English and math, just to name a few. In all careers, having the skills to be

an effective communicator sets our students apart and gives them tools necessary to navigate academia and life."



"I am incredibly proud of the team's efforts throughout the season – it is excellent for the team to have all their hard work recognized nationally," Forensics Speech and Debate Co-captain Ethan Sepulveda said. "Río Hondo College's Speech and Debate team has had an extremely positive impact on my life, both in and out of college. Being able to analyze the

world and how it functions and having the tools to advocate for myself has equipped me to excel both in studying English and establishing connections with people of all perspectives on an every day basis."

The 10th place national ranking has been just one of the program's highlights of the year. The program also placed sixth overall in the Large School Division both Speech and Debate at California Community College State Championships in March and earned second place sweeps in the Community College Division at the Gaske Championship in February.

Additionally, the program took home first place in the top two-year school division in October 2022 during a tournament at Point Loma Nazarene University.

Río Hondo College Hosts Meeting to Address Homelessness

Río Hondo College hosted a meeting in association with the Los Angeles Alliance for Human Rights and Tzunu Strategies for local city managers to address the issue of homelessness on March 21.

This meeting, the first of its kind in Los Angeles County, provided city managers, deputy city managers, police chiefs, and city representatives from nearly 30 cities in the county with the opportunity to be briefed by attorneys and city managers involved in a legal settlement in Orange County. At the meeting, city managers had the opportunity to exchange best practices for addressing homelessness in a safe and supportive environment.

Superintendent/President Dr. Marilyn Flores and Dean of Public Safety Mark Yokoyama provided welcoming remarks. Río Hondo College student representatives interested in issues of homelessness and public policy also attended the event.

This meeting was made possible through a collaboration between Tzunu Strategies, the Administration of Justice Division, and the Río Hondo College Office of Government and Community Relations.



High School Students Learn Career Direction from Río Hondo College Professors

Río Hondo College hosted Mark Keppel High School's automotive students for a day of learning and activities in the Career Technology Education (CTE) department on March 17.

Students learned about the College's many automotive programs, including the Bachelor of Science Degree in Automotive Technology. Keppel High students engaged in hands-on activities taught by Instructor

Michael Dighera. Students were able to build and test electrical circuits with resistance.

Students were also treated to lunch and enjoyed a tour of the automotive department and the Río Hondo College campus before heading back to their high school campus.



College Updates

Río Hondo College will host its annual Student Success Celebration from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Friday, May 12, honoring the accomplishments of the graduating students that are part of the College's special



student populations and support programs. Attendance for the event, which will be held on campus, is by invitation only and for students who are confirmed to graduate for the 2023 school year.



During the April 12 Board of Trustees meeting, Dr. Stephen Kibui and Public Safety Dean Mark Yokoyama gave a presentation outlining the College's Campus Police Department in regard to safety, preparedness, accountability, certification, professional oversight and high standards. They also reported on budget, chain of command and a vision for campus police, which would see the officers on campus as quardians and models of community care.

During the April 12 Board of Trustees meeting Counselor Delmis Alvarado became tenured full-time faculty.



Río Hondo College's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program members celebrated assisting community members with their income tax filings (at no cost) from February through April. The clinic transmitted 230 tax returns this season, averaging \$250 per return, meaning a savings of \$57,000 in tax filing fees to the community.

The clinic processed \$258,000 in tax refunds, over \$71,000 in earned income tax credits and \$20,000 in education credits.



Río Hondo College was recently awarded the Equal Employment Opportunities Innovative Best Practices Grants by the Chancellor's Office Institutional Effectiveness Division and Office of the General Counsel. The grant, totaling \$299,897, is intended to enhance and expand hiring practices and faculty and staff diversity. Pending the Board of Governors' approval, the grant will take effect June 1, 2023.



Professor of Art and Art History Sheila Lynch, during the April 12 Board of Trustees meeting, gave a presentation on her one-year sabbatical, where she explored Open Educational Resources (OER) which provides teaching, learning and research materials for free. Lynch said OER would make education more accessible, affordable and equitable. Lynch is also working on a proposal to use the Chancellor's Office ZTC Planning Grant of \$200,000 to ensure a zero textbook cost degree pathway – where students can complete their degree without ever having to pay for a commercial textbook.
